PARTICIPANTS

Edward Alexander

Edward Alexander is the Senior Arctic Lead of the Woodwell Climate Research Center. Additionally, he represents the Gwich'in as the Co-Chair of Gwich'in Council International (GCI) and has been appointed by the Chiefs of Alaska for multiple terms. He recently completed a term as the GCI Head of Delegation to the Senior Arctic Officials, and the Conservation of Arctic Flora and Fauna, and continues to serve in the Emergency Prevention, Preparedness, and Response (EPPR) working groups of the Arctic Council. Additionally, he has served as the Co-Chair of the Arctic Council's Chairship Initiative on Wildland Fire under the Norwegian Chairship.

Eda Ayaydin

Eda Ayaydin is a Teaching Fellow at the University of London Institute in Paris and a Visiting Research Fellow at the Mershon Center for International Security Studies at Ohio State University. Her work explores Arctic geopolitics, sovereignty, and non-Arctic interest in the region, with a particular focus on the performative dimensions of international relations. Her current projects examine narrative politics and how liberal actors respond to populist and revisionist narratives.

David Balton

David Balton is a Senior Fellow with the Harvard Kennedy School's Arctic Initiative. He previously served as the Executive Director of the Arctic Executive Steering Committee, which coordinates U.S. Arctic policy, and as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Oceans and Fisheries in the Department of State, attaining the rank of Ambassador in 2006. During the U.S. Arctic Council Chairmanship (2015-2017), he served as Chair of the Senior Arctic Officials. He also chaired or co-chaired negotiations that produced the 2011 Arctic Search and Rescue Agreement, the 2013 Arctic Marine Oil Pollution Agreement, and the 2018 Central Arctic Ocean Fisheries Agreement.





Justin Barnes

Justin Barnes is a Predoctoral Research Fellow at the Belfer Center's Arctic Initiative and a PhD candidate at the Balsillie School of International Affairs. Barnes is also a Research Fellow at the North American and Arctic Defence and Security Network (NAADSN) and Canada Fellow at Polar Research and Policy Initiative (PRPI). Barnes is a Managing Editor at the Arctic Yearbook (arcticyearbook.com), an annual interdisciplinary peer-reviewed volume focused on Arctic politics, governance, and security.

George Beebe

George Beebe is director of grand strategy at the Quincy Institute. He spent more than two decades in government as an intelligence analyst, diplomat, and policy advisor, including as director of the CIA's Russia analysis, director of the CIA's Open Source Center, and as a staff advisor on Russia matters to Vice President Cheney. His book, *The Russia Trap: How Our Shadow War with Russia Could Spiral into Nuclear Catastrophe* (St. Martin's Press, 2019), warned how the United States and Russia could stumble into a dangerous military confrontation. Prior to joining QI, George was Vice President and Director of Studies at the Center for the National Interest and before that he served as president of a technology company that measured the impact of events, issues, and advertising campaigns on audience views. He speaks Russian and German.

Paul Arthur Berkman

Professor Paul Arthur Berkman is a Fellow of the International Science Council and Fulbright Specialist 2024-2027 with the United States Department of State. He founded the Science Diplomacy Center, Inc. nonprofit in the United States in 2022. He is a Faculty Associate with the Program on Negotiation at Harvard Law School and a Visiting Distinguished Professor with the International Institute of Science Diplomacy and Sustainability (IISDS) in Malaysia. In 2010 at the University of Cambridge, Prof. Berkman chaired and co-directed with MGIMO University the first (and only) formal dialogue between NATO and Russia regarding security in the Arctic.





Evan Bloom

Evan T. Bloom is a lawyer and former U.S. diplomat. He is Senior Advisor to the Centre for the Ocean and the Arctic of the Arctic University of Norway, Polar Governance Chair at the Ted Stevens Center for Arctic Security Studies and Adjunct Professor at the Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies of the University of Tasmania. At the U.S. Department of State he served as Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Oceans and Fisheries and Director of the Office of Ocean and Polar Affairs. Bloom helped establish the Arctic Council, negotiating its initial rules and documents in 1996 and he supervised U.S. representation in the Council from 2006 to 2020.

Judy Boyd

Judy Boyd is a Senior Fellow at The Arctic Institute. Her research interests include national security, geopolitics, international law, and Arctic governance. She is currently Senior Information Law Counsel for the United States Coast Guard and a Colonel and Judge Advocate in the United States Army Reserve.

Romain Chuffart

Dr. Romain Chuffart is the President and Managing Director of The Arctic Institute - Center for Circumpolar Security Studies and the current Nansen Professor in Arctic Studies at the University of Akureyri in Iceland. He holds a PhD in law from Durham University and focuses on Arctic governance, international law, and Indigenous rights. His work supports policy development on environmental protection, ocean governance, and regional security. Romain has led research projects with partners across the Arctic and published widely on legal and political challenges in the region. He brings practical experience in international cooperation and stakeholder engagement to promote Arctic collaboration.

August T. Desch

Gus is a legislative assistant for Congressman Warren Davidson of Ohio, handling the congressman's foreign affairs committee portfolio as well as broader defense and domestic policy issues. Previously he worked for Senator Mike Lee of Utah. Gus is a 2021 graduate of the University of Notre Dame and a 2025 Masters graduate from the Naval War College. Earlier this year Gus's boss founded the Congressional Greenland Caucus to facilitate members of Congress learning more about Arctic security and trade issues.

Pavel Devyatkin

Pavel Devyatkin is a Senior Associate and Leadership Group member at The Arctic Institute. An American of Russian ancestry, Pavel moved to Moscow in 2021 to work/study there during Russia's Arctic Council chairmanship. Pavel teaches BA and MA courses on international relations at the Higher School of Economics. His research on Arctic security, cooperation, and U.S.-Russia-China relations has been published by the U.S. Department of Defense, Polar Journal, Russian International Affairs Council, Responsible Statecraft, and others. He has presented at events organized by the Arctic Council, Oxford University, Moscow State Institute of International Relations, Ocean University of China, Fridtjof Nansen Institute, and others. Pavel is a graduate of the London School of Economics and University College London.

Mark Episkopos

Mark Episkopos is a research fellow in the Quincy Institute's Eurasia Program. He is also an Adjunct Professor of History at Marymount University. Episkopos holds a PhD in history from American University and a masters degree in international affairs from Boston University. His research focuses on great power competition and the international system, the transatlantic relationship, Russian foreign policy, military thought and capabilities, and domestic politics, and issues in Eastern European security. Episkopos was previously the National Security Reporter for The National Interest, where he wrote widely on military and foreign affairs topics.

Iris Ferguson

Iris A. Ferguson served as the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Arctic and Global Resilience. In this role, she served as the principal advisor to the Secretary of Defense and senior leadership on protecting U.S. homeland and Allied interests in the Arctic region; managed oceans policy and the freedom of navigation program to uphold the maritime rules-based order; addressed strategic resilience risks including critical minerals and energy security; and ensured the Department maintained innovation advantages in strategic competition. Prior to her current appointment, Ms. Ferguson was a Senior Advisor on Arctic and energy security issues for U.S. Air Force Futures and the Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations. In those capacities, she authored and implemented the Department of the Air Force's Arctic Strategy including advising on strategic initiatives, operations, and international partnerships related to the region.





Lyle Goldstein

Lyle Goldstein is the Director of Asia Engagement at Defense Priorities. He maintains expertise in both Chinese and Russian military strategic development, and also has knowledge regarding particular issues in the China-Russia relationship, including especially the Arctic and Central Asia. Goldstein serves concurrently as Director of the China Initiative and Senior Fellow at the Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs at Brown University.

Thomas Graham

Thomas E. Graham is a distinguished fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations. His book, Getting Russia Right, was published in September, 2023. He is a cofounder of Yale University's Russian, East European, and Eurasian studies program and sits on its faculty steering committee. He is also a research scholar at Yale's MacMillan Center. He has been a lecturer in global affairs and political science since 2011, teaching courses on U.S.-Russian relations and Russian foreign policy, as well as cybersecurity and counterterrorism. Graham was special assistant to the president and senior director for Russia on the National Security Council staff from 2004 to 2007, during which he managed a White House-Kremlin strategic dialogue. He was director for Russian affairs on the staff from 2002 to 2004.

Ole Jørgen Hammeken

Ole Jørgen Hammeken is an Inuit elder born in Nuuk, Greenland. He is a polar explorer, artist, actor, author and educator. Trained as a lawyer in Copenhagen, he chose to return to his fatherland to work with neglected Inuit children and preserve local culture and traditions. To the general audience he is known as a lead actor playing the old polar bear hunter Ikuma in Greenlandic film *INUK* that has won over 25 prizes at international film festivals. He led and participated in many expeditions in the Arctic, including *The Polar Passage 2000* – a circumnavigation of the Arctic Ocean in a small open boat. Ole Jørgen is a fellow international at The Explorers Cub in New York. He was featured in many documentaries dedicated to the Arctic such as *Silent Snow, Inuit School, La Longue Trace* and others. He regularly talks as an expert on climate change and indigenous issues on BBC, Euronews, CBS, National Geographic and others. The world's northernmost mountain in Peary Land, *Hammeken Point*, was named after him.





Guobjorg Rikey Hauksdottir

Ríkey Hauksdóttir is a Predoctoral Research Fellow with the Belfer Center's Arctic Initiative and a PhD Candidate at the University of Iceland, where she researches China-Russia relations in the Arctic. She is also a research fellow at the North American and Arctic Defence and Security Network. She previously worked as a Project Manager at the Centre for Arctic Studies and has a background in journalism and radio broadcasting.

Lassi Heininen

Dr. Lassi Heininen is a Professor Emeritus, Visiting Researcher at Aleksanteri Institute, University of Helsinki; Adjunct Graduate Faculty Member at Trent University, Ontario; Editor of *Arctic Yearbook*; Leader of the University of the Arctic Thematic Network on Geopolitics & Security. His research fields include IR, Geopolitics, Security Studies, Environmental Politics, Arctic Studies, with a recent focus on cooperation in world politics / IR. Among his latest publications are "From Neutrality and Peacemaking to Military Alignment – Finland's Illusive Geopolitical Imagination" (*Global Arctic Handbook* by Springer); "Environmental Security is 'Must' vis-a-vis Military Security, Not a 'Substitution'" (*Strategic Analysis* by Routledge); "Geopolitical Features, Common Interests and the Climate Crisis: The Case of the Arctic" (*Geneva Paper* 35/2024).

Victoria Herrmann

Dr. Victoria Herrmann is a Senior Fellow and Leadership Group member at The Arctic Institute, where her research focuses on climate change, community adaptation, resilient development, and geopolitics. From 2016 to 2021, Victoria was the President and Managing Director of The Arctic Institute, where she led the U.S. incorporation and global growth of TAI as a premiere think and do tank. Previously, she was TAI's North America Director. Victoria has testified before the U.S. Senate, served as the Alaska Review Editor for the Fourth National Climate Assessment, contributes to The Guardian and Scientific American on climate policy, and was named one of the most 100 influential people in climate policy worldwide in 2022 by Apolitical. She has published in many peer-review journals and her expert opinion has appeared on CNN, BBC, and NPR among others, and was a 2021-2022 White House Fellow.





Nong Hong

Dr. HONG Nong is the Executive Director and Senior Fellow of the Institute for China–America Studies. She was ITLOS-Nippon Fellow for International Dispute Settlement and Visiting Fellow at Australian National Centre for Ocean Resources and Security, the Center of Oceans Law and Policy, University of Virginia, and at the Max Planck Institute for Comparative Public Law and International Law. Her research takes an interdisciplinary approach to examining international relations and international law, with focus on ocean governance in East Asia and the Arctic; law of the sea; international security; and international dispute settlement and conflict resolution. Her selected monographs include US and China Global Maritime Relations (Routledge, 2024), China's Role in the Arctic: Observing and Being Observed (London and New York: Routledge, 2020), UNCLOS and Ocean Dispute Settlement: Law and Politics in the South China Sea (Routledge, 2012).

Amy Myers Jaffe

Amy Myers Jaffe serves as Director of the Energy, Climate Justice and Sustainability Lab at New York University's School of Professional Studies and is a research professor who teaches graduate-level courses examining global climate finance, clean technology innovation and business, and energy and climate justice. A leading expert on global energy policy, sustainability, and geopolitical risk, Jaffe is author of several books, including her most recent book, "Energy's Digital Future" published in 2021 by Columbia University Press. Ms. Jaffe is a non-resident Senior Fellow at the Climate Policy Lab at Tufts University and a regular contributor to the popular podcast "The Energy Gang." From 2014 to 2017, Ms. Jaffe served as senior advisor on sustainability to the Office of the Chief Investment Officer of the University of California, Regents, where she helped design the sustainable investing framework for the UC's \$140 billion pension and endowment funds.





Michael Kiselycznyk

Mike Kiselycznyk works in the Office of the Ambassador-at-Large for Arctic Affairs at the Department of State and was the senior advisor to the first-ever U.S. Arctic Ambassador, Mike Sfraga. A Foreign Service Officer since 2011, he has served as the Political-Military and External Affairs Unit Chief in Warsaw, Poland (2020-2023), Assistant to the Ambassador in Kabul, Afghanistan (2018-2019), a Political-Military Officer in Seoul, South Korea (2015-2018), a Consular Officer in Beijing, China (2013-2015), and a Human Rights Officer in Abuja, Nigeria (2011-2013). Prior to joining the Foreign Service, he was a Research Assistant at the National Defense University – Institute for National Strategic Study, where he published on Chinese civilmilitary relations and military transparency.

Kathleen Larkin

Kathleen Larkin has served as the U.S. Department of State's Arctic Security Officer since 2019. She joined as a Presidential Management Fellow in 2013 and served as a budget analyst in the Bureau of Budget and Planning until 2015. During her fellowship, she participated in development rotations on the Albania Desk and in the Political and Economic Section at U.S. Embassy Lisbon, Portugal. From 2015-2019, Kathleen worked as the Bosnia and Herzegovina Desk Officer. From July 2024-February 2025, Kathleen served as the Director for the Balkans and Central Europe at the National Security Council, leading interagency efforts in seventeen countries.

Marlene Laruelle

Marlene Laruelle, Ph.D., is Research Professor of International Affairs and Political Science at the Elliott School of International Affairs, The George Washington University. She is also Director of the Illiberalism Studies Program at GW and the former director of the Institute for European, Russian and Eurasian Studies (IERES). She has been working on Russia's Arctic policies for years and her new book, co-authored with Jean Radvanyi, *Russia's Arctic. Strategic Front, Economic Challenges, and Climate Change*, will be published in the fall by Bloomsbury.





Cynthia Lazaroff

Cynthia Lazaroff is the Founder of Women Transforming Our Nuclear Legacy and NuclearWakeUpCall.Earth. She has practiced Track II diplomacy and founded groundbreaking U.S.-Russian exchanges since the early 1980s. Cynthia is facilitating a Track II initiative to advance the meaningful participation of Ukrainian and Russian women and civil society in the peace process to ensure a sustainable peace. She is organizing Bering Strait for Peace, an expedition and exchange with Indigenous Peoples, in partnership with Arctic Without Borders, Wisdom Weavers of the World and The Arctic Institute. Cynthia is the author of Dawn of a New Armageddon and a recipient of the Nuclear Age Peace Foundation's Women Waging Peace Award.

Andrei Ledenev

Andrei Ledenev is Minister-Counsellor, Deputy Chief of Mission Embassy of the Russian Federation in the United States. Andrei Ledenev has been working as Minister-Counsellor and Deputy Chief of Mission of the Russian Embassy in Washington, D.C. since August 2022. He is responsible for foreign policy and economic issues. Mr Ledenev's tenure started in January 2022, when he arrived to D.C. as Senior Counsellor and Head of Economic Office of the Embassy. His prior postings abroad include Ottawa (2014-2017), London (2010-2014), as well as Washington, D.C. (2003-2008). While in Moscow in between foreign assignments, Andrei worked at the North American Department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Russia, covering issues of economic cooperation with the U.S. and Canada. He graduated from the Moscow State Institute of International Relations in 2001, where he studied international finance and banking. Mr Ledenev was born in 1979. He is married with two children.

Anatol Lieven

Anatol Lieven is Director of the Eurasia Program at the Quincy Institute for Responsible Statecraft in Washington DC. He holds a BA and Ph.D. in history from Cambridge University in England. His latest book, *Climate Change and the Nation State*, was published in paperback in 2021 by Penguin (UK) Oxford University Press. The second edition of his book *America Right or Wrong: An Anatomy of American Nationalism* appeared in 2012. From 1986 to 1998, Anatol Lieven worked as a British journalist in South Asia, Afghanistan, the former Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. He is author of several books on these regions and writes on them for the media.

Anastasia Likhacheva

Dr. Anastasia Likhacheva works as Dean of the Faculty of World Economy and International Affairs at the Higher School of Economics (HSE), Russia. Her key area of expertise is international political economy with implications for Russian foreign policy.

She ran the *ThinkArctic Project* within the Chairmanship of Russia in the Arctic Council 2021-2023. In 2022, she edited a book *Arctic Fever: Political, Economic & Environmental Aspects* in Palgrave Macmillan. The book united scholars from 11 countries and dozens of academic institutions. Currently she supervises PhD research on Arctic regimes and supports Arctic studies at the HSE WEIA faculty.

Rebecca Lynge

Rebecca Lynge is Deputy Head of the Greenland Representation to the US and Canada since 2023. She has served the Government of Greenland's Ministry for Foreign Affairs since 2015, where she initially covered trade policy. In 2016, Rebecca was appointed the Kingdom of Denmark's Head of Delegation to the Arctic Council's Sustainable Development Working Group (SDWG). Rebecca also represented Greenland on indigenous issues, working to achieve the goals of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. From 2017 - 2020, Rebecca was posted as First Secretary to the Greenland Representation in Washington, D.C. Here her work focused on raising awareness, putting Greenland and Arctic issues on the agenda and cultivating relevant partnerships and networks with the United States and Canada. Rebecca was also Policy Adviser on human rights and indigenous issues at the Permanent Mission of Denmark to the United Nations in New York and served as Greenland's Senior representative to the Arctic Council.





Marisol Maddox

Marisol Maddox is a Senior Arctic Fellow at the Institute of Arctic Studies in the Dickey Center at Dartmouth. She serves as a Senior Associate (non-resident) in the Europe, Russia, and Eurasia Program at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). She is a non-resident research fellow at the Center for Climate and Security, and a term member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Her transdisciplinary research considers the Arctic nexus of climate change, security, and geopolitics. Maddox served as an Arctic subject matter expert at the non-partisan Woodrow Wilson Center's Polar Institute from 2018-2025. She holds a master's degree in international security with a concentration in transnational challenges from George Mason University's Schar School, and a bachelor's degree in environmental studies with a concentration in ecosystems from SUNY Binghamton.

Harion Merculieff

Ilarion (Kuuyux) Merculieff is co-founder and former chairman of the Alaska Indigenous Council on Marine Mammals; former chairman of the Nature Conservancy, Alaska chapter; former codirector of the Native American Fish and Wildlife Society, Alaska chapter; as well as co-founder of the International Bering Sea Forum, the Alaska Forum on the Environment, and the Alaska Oceans Network. Merculieff served on the National Research Council Committee on the Bering Sea Ecosystem and presented at numerous scientific conferences. He is president of the Global Center for Indigenous Leadership and Lifeways.

Galya Morrell

Galya Morrell is a polar explorer and environmental artist, she has spent over 50 years living and traveling across the Arctic. Born into a Komi-Pomor family, she follows in the footsteps of reindeer herders and sea mammal hunters. Her rare genre—visual synthetic performance on drifting sea ice—fuses Indigenous tradition with modern expression. Her nomadic exhibitions travel by dog sled, reindeer, Arctic horse, kayak, and boat to the world's most remote communities. With her Greenlandic husband, Ole Jørgen Hammeken, she co-founded Arctic Without Borders, Arctic Arts and Expedition Avannaa, citizen diplomacy initiatives fostering cultural bridges to the world's most isolated communities affected by climate and societal change. They offer a unique view of the people and their natural habitats in the hardest-to-reach places that otherwise stay invisible to the eyes of decision makers and general audiences worldwide.

George Noll

George Noll is a member of the US senior foreign service with the rank of Minister Counselor. He joined the Department of State in 1997 and most recently served as head of the Office of Palestinian Affairs in Jerusalem. Sara Olsvig actively contributed to the work of the Constitutional Commission of Greenland, the Human Rights Council of Greenland and was member of the UN Secretary-General's Panel on Critical Energy Transition Minerals. Olsvig holds a Master of Science in Anthropology and currently pursues a PhD-degree at Ilisimatusarfik, the University of Greenland. Olsvig is a recipient of the 2023 Womenomics Inclusion Award. Sara Olsvig is Inuk, and was born in Nuuk, Greenland, where she resides with her partner and their children.





Pan Min

Dr. PAN Min is a professor at the School of Political Science and International Relations, Tongji University. She obtained her Ph.D. in History from Nanjing University in 2003. Dr. PAN has long been dedicated to research on international polar issues. She has conducted academic visits and attended conferences in Arctic and other countries, as well as conducted field research in both the Arctic and Antarctic. She has published over 70 academic papers in both domestic and international journals, along with four monographs, three translated works, and more than 20 research reports. Dr. PAN is also passionate about polar science popularization and has actively engaged in public education through platforms and primary and secondary school classrooms.
